TASTE TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

The Trustees present their report of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024.

In setting our programme each year we have regard to both the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and prevention and relief of poverty for the public benefit. The Trustees always ensure that the programmes we undertake are in line with our charitable objects and aims.



Our legal objects

TASTE is an international non-governmental organisation (NGO), non-political organisation established in 1999.

It is constituted under a trust deed dated 7 September 1999 (amended 04 June 2021). TASTE is a Christian charity registered with the Charity Commission under registration number 1077304.

The Trust Deed defines the charity's Objects as being:

To preserve and protect the health of people in Nigeria by enabling them to locate and access underground water stores as well as the safe use of the necessary equipment to achieve this and providing and assisting in the provision of any other associated facilities, support services and equipment not normally provided by the statutory authorities.

To advance the education of the public in Nigeria in health care, by the provision of lectures, fora, and by the publication of newsletters devoted to healthcare.


The Charity formally became a CIO with the name Transfer of Appropriate Technology and Expertise – United Kingdom (TASTE-UK) on 23 July 2024 with the Reg. Charity No.: 1209253. The formal transfer of asset from the old to the new Charity was done on 31 December 2024.

Trustees and organisational structure

As a UK charity operating overseas, TASTE set up TASTE Nigeria as a locally registered charity with its own independent board of Trustees ensuring compliance with local regulations that has the responsibility for the oversight of the delivery of quality services to the needy communities across Nigeria.

The UK Trustees and the CEO work closely and met 5 times in 2024.

There shall be at least three UK Trustees, who are responsible in law for the running of TASTE. Two new Trustees, Carol Thomson and Marilyn Stanley were appointed as Trustees taking the total up to 5. The Trustees continue to seek to recruit additional, appropriately qualified and experienced persons to join the board. The Trustees are particularly keen to recruit from across the country to reflect the wider national supporter base.



The CEO visited Nigeria once in the period covered by this report. He met staff and held meetings with TASTE Nigeria Trustees and TASTE Nigeria Country Director and visited TASTE UK funded projects.

The UK Trustees have long experience of being involved with charities and aside from any expenses were not remunerated for their trusteeship.

- Carol Thomson as an Accountant, gave support to Andy Bryce and helped with the financial aspects of the preparations towards conversion to Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) structure.

Our Staff

TASTE has a very clear belief that all of our people are vital to our success.

Ben Udejiofo as the CEO has ensured the continuation of the vital service that the charity is providing to poor communities in Nigeria.

Jackie Kieran, the Administrative Support, has worked with the CEO and Andy Bryce on various Admin roles, including finance.

Patron

Dan Walker (TV Presenter & Broadcaster) as our Patron continues to be an effective figurehead for TASTE, always seeking to raise funds, awareness and increase our supporter base. Dan attended our 25th Anniversary and interviewed the CEO as part of the Thanksgiving Service.

Advisers

We are grateful to God for our professional advisers; John Newton (Accountant - TASTE UK) We called upon John Newton's services again this year to examine our Final Accounts John Newton's professional support was given free of charge.

Ecorys, Leeds, is an international provider of research, consulting, programme management and communications services, which annually use their expertise through Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) to help us apply for funding from grant making organisations.

Risk management

As a small charity, TASTE relies heavily on its CEO, the TASTE Nigeria Country Director and the newly appointed TASTE Nigeria Country Administrator as well as our Trustees to help identify and manage risks. Political and religious conflicts, corruption and crime continue to be the major risks to TASTE's Nigerian operation.

In the UK investing the entire operation in the hands of the CEO, supported by a part-time Admin Support is the main risk. Procedures to mitigate these risks are being established. The appointment of the Admin Support to work with the CEO is the first step to addressing the risk of investing the entire operation of TASTE UK in just the CEO.

Policies

Selection of investments:

All the charity's funds are being used for working capital and therefore no funds are invested

Reserves policy:

It is intended to keep all reserves in a positive state and not to commit to expenditure until the funds are available. Donated assets are included in the accounts as an incoming resource into a restricted fund.

Grant-making policies:

Donations may be made to suitable recipients. TASTE made no grants in 2024. Our Object this year was met, however, by using our funds to deliver successful projects in many needy communities/institutions in Nigeria, using the expertise within TASTE Nigeria rather than through grants to individuals. A summary of the achievements is given below.



Projects & Activities undertaken in 2024

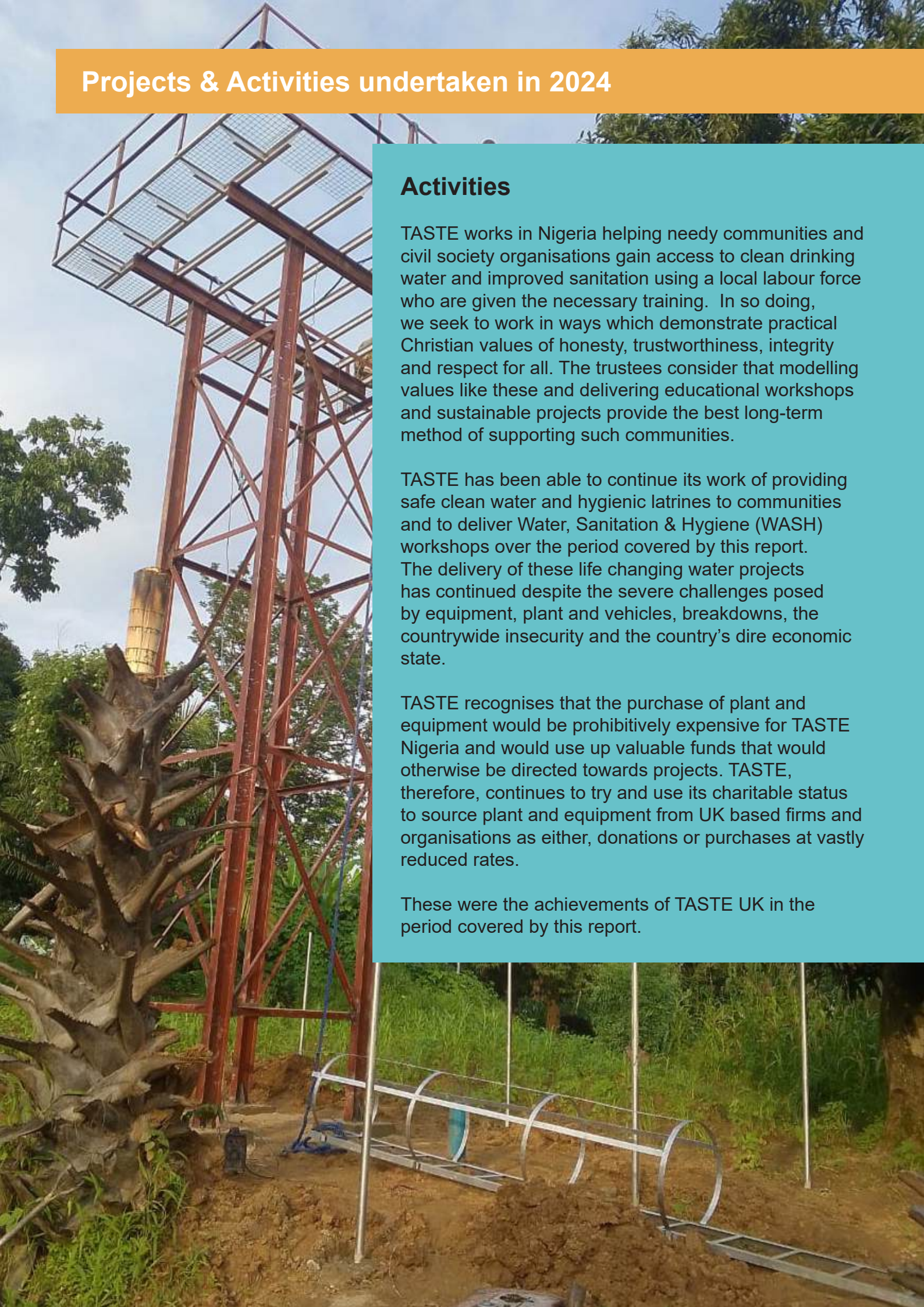
Activities

TASTE works in Nigeria helping needy communities and civil society organisations gain access to clean drinking water and improved sanitation using a local labour force who are given the necessary training. In so doing, we seek to work in ways which demonstrate practical Christian values of honesty, trustworthiness, integrity and respect for all. The trustees consider that modelling values like these and delivering educational workshops and sustainable projects provide the best long-term method of supporting such communities.

TASTE has been able to continue its work of providing safe clean water and hygienic latrines to communities and to deliver Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH) workshops over the period covered by this report. The delivery of these life changing water projects has continued despite the severe challenges posed by equipment, plant and vehicles, breakdowns, the countrywide insecurity and the country's dire economic state.

TASTE recognises that the purchase of plant and equipment would be prohibitively expensive for TASTE Nigeria and would use up valuable funds that would otherwise be directed towards projects. TASTE, therefore, continues to try and use its charitable status to source plant and equipment from UK based firms and organisations as either, donations or purchases at vastly reduced rates.

These were the achievements of TASTE UK in the period covered by this report.



Projects & Activities undertaken in 2024

TASTE 25th Anniversary Celebration

We remembered and celebrated on Saturday 7 September 2024 how a dream to provide water to one Nigeria village has led to, over 1.3 million lives being impacted through the provision of safe, clean water and sanitation to communities across Nigeria 25 years later.

We praised the Lord that we were able to work throughout these years maintaining our Christian witness with integrity and honesty, reminding ourselves that the Lord is good! We are thankful to the Lord for all who were involved in the preparation and on the night. Special thanks go to All Saints Ecclesall Church for accommodating us, Pastor Tim Smylie for bringing us back to the foundational truths of Psalm 34, to our Patron Dan Walker for interviewing Ben our CEO and to the TASTE trustees for organising the Thanksgiving Service.

Projects & Activities undertaken in 2024



Scott Bader Project (£25,000)

The project focused on mobilising two communities of Kagoro and Manchok in Southern Kaduna affected by armed conflict, to rebuild their lives and live more sustainably. The primary aim of the project was to provide a sustainable source of clean water and to increase the communities' knowledge of good water, sanitation and hygiene practices. It also provided the communities with training on the care of the environment and the importance of community based savings and loans schemes for economic growth.

The project will thereby change attitude and behaviour, making for more stable and sustainable communities. The project will also support the communities in building resilience against diseases and to develop a mechanism for early warning systems of pending disease and social crises.



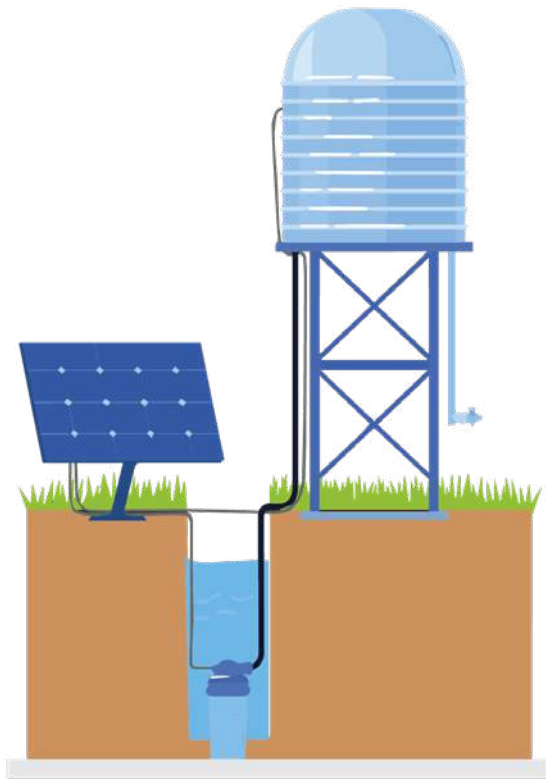
Projects & Activities undertaken in 2024

Capacity building on WASH, neglected tropical diseases, sustainable development goals, and nutrition were also delivered. Water management committees and Village Savings and Loans Associations (VSLA)/Self-help Groups (SHG) were also set up in the course of the project. The project saw the:

- Training of 29 selected community members on WASH
- Formation of Water Management and Self-Help Groups
- Drilling of 2 solar powered boreholes
- Construction of two, 25,000 litre steel overhead storage tanks mounted on fabricated steel towers
- Installation of pipes and the piping of water from the Solar Powered Boreholes to several locations within the communities
- Supporting of approximately 7,000 people (5,000 Direct and 2,000 Indirect) to gain access to safe, clean drinking water
- Support for 50 community members to build Household Latrines in project communities

377,000 (approx.) people are continually being served by these facilities, reducing incidences of waterborne diseases significantly.

Praise God for the opportunity to serve these communities through access to clean and safe water, but more importantly the opportunities these projects afford us to demonstrate God's love.



How we work



TASTE UK achieves its charitable aims through direct project delivery in Nigeria where the Nigerian organisation has its own staff, plant & equipment and a separate Board of Trustees.

The work is funded through various means.

In Nigeria:

- **Contributions from the recipient community or organisations;** mainly by the provision of land for the project, lodging and security for our staff and secure compound for our equipment and materials and non-skilled manual labour as required
- **In-country grants made via foreign embassies and other international and Nigeria based NGOs**

In the UK:

- **UK Trusts and organisations** through funding applications
- **Churches** through regular donations and special appeal to their congregations
- **Individual Supporters** through one off gifts or regular giving through standing order or direct debit
- **Fundraising events**, both by TASTE and our supporters
- **Business contacts** who may give financially or donate plant or equipment or expertise through Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

UK fundraising initiatives:

We are very thankful to God for our army of supporters across the country who go to incredible lengths to support our work. Examples include:

The Quilting Hive: Our CEO was invited to meet some of the Quilting (they do a lot more besides) Hive members in Sheffield to receive the £500 which it had raised for our work in Nigeria. 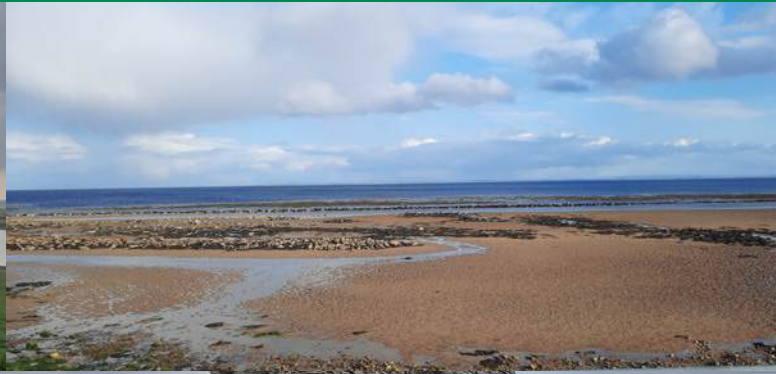
UK fundraising initiatives:

GoodTASTE Sheffield Fairtrade Shop donated £4,000 being its profit from 2023 trading. The donation was used to rehabilitate 52 hand pumps in Bassa, Jos South and Jos North in Plateau State, and Zangon Kataf in Kaduna

LE JOG



Land's End to John O'Groats (LE JOG) sponsored Hike/Bike 2023. This fundraising initiative wasn't only the biggest for the period covered by this report, but it was the biggest ever undertaken by TASTE. The plan was to cover the full length of the UK mainland from Land's End to John O'Groats (LE JOG) dividing the whole 1,300 miles into 13 Stages of approximately 100 miles each.



Our intrepid supporters took responsibility for one or part of a Stage either doing or organising friends, family, colleagues etc to complete the section or Stage chosen. The event which started in June 2023 will be completed by the end of Summer 2025. Only sections of Stages 5 and 12 – a total distance of approximately 100 miles remain. We are very confident that our fundraising target of £13,000 will be reached as the amount raised so far stands at **£12,934**.

We praise God for all our dear friends who have stepped up to meet this mammoth challenge with stories of sacrifice and selflessness.

Our supporters

TASTE believes that our supporters are vital to our work and that if we are to expand our work in Nigeria, we need to retain our existing supporters whilst at the same time recruiting more. We are therefore proactive in using the social media of Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and our website. We use these social media platforms to communicate with our supporters and society at large.

In 2024 we also produced regular prayer letters to encourage our supporters to pray for our work and to give thanks to God for the positive impact that our work continues to have in needy communities across Nigeria.

Much of the time TASTE is engaged in discrete projects but occasionally will collaborate with other agencies as part of a larger, wider-ranging project.

Our aim always is to ensure that our time limited involvement, whilst bringing benefit, does not disadvantage or undermine the sustainability of the communities we serve. In order to minimise any detrimental impact our activities may have, we support the training of members of the communities, particularly women to maintain the projects.

As much as possible TASTE Nigeria uses local labour in any non-drilling construction (e.g. latrines construction etc) and also seeks to purchase materials from local businesses in order to ensure that the benefits of our work are maximised across the local economy.

Voluntary help

The Trustees are very grateful to God for the volunteers in the UK who helped during the year. Without our volunteers it would be impossible to organise the many fundraising activities that take place annually. In the UK we were able to call upon 4 volunteers.

Plans for the future

During 2025 we hope to continue to increase the profile of the newly established CIO TASTE-UK, especially among the Nigerians in the UK, a large proportion of whom are based in London. Their help and support would enable us to increase the vital, life changing work that we are doing in Nigeria.

We are also actively working on forming a partnership with The University of Loughborough to set up a trial of Afrak in Nigeria. Afrak is a groundbreaking initiative that combines solar microgrids and tailored tractors to empower smallholder farmers across Africa. It aims to significantly increase crop yields and smallholder incomes while providing access to clean water, and green electricity in rural communities.

We are also collaborating with Self Help Africa to develop systems to manage rural water suppliers to ensure sustainability of these for generations to come.

We will also seek, during 2025, to step up our fundraising initiatives by the ongoing implementation of our fundraising strategy; to increase funds to enable us to reach more needy communities with life changing water. The main way that we intend to do this is by increasing our partnerships with churches across the country.

The increase in our unrestricted funds will also enable us to help TASTE Nigeria to continue to develop the site of its permanent headquarters which they moved into in August 2022, and which was dedicated in November 2022. The plan is for the Headquarters to incorporate a workshop run by a fully qualified and suitably experienced mechanic. This development has addressed the Nigerian team's need for increased office space and employing a mechanic will ensure the adequate maintenance of vehicles and equipment.

Our support will also help TASTE Nigeria increase its capacity to fulfil its commitments to all its partners including Tearfund Nigeria, ECWA, SIM, City Ministries, and WorldServe, and to continue its programme of expansion across Nigeria.

However, central to everything that we do are our Christian values, and ethos. We will endeavour, by God's grace, to keep these clearly at the centre of our activities throughout 2025.

As the charity's trustees, you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").



Notes to the accounts

1) Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

- accounting standards; and
- Accounting and Reporting by Charities – Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2015); and
- the Charities Act 2011.

2) Accounting policies

Branches

The organisation in Nigeria is established under a separate trust deed to the UK charity and therefore is a distinct legal entity with its own trustees. It has not been accounted for as a branch and consequently the income and expenditure of the Nigerian entity have not been consolidated within these accounts. All assets and liabilities of TASTE Nigeria are not included on the balance sheet.

Incoming resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when;

- The charity becomes entitled to the resource;
- The trustees are virtually certain they will receive it; and
- The monetary value can be reliably measured.

Donations

These are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resource.

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

Incoming resources from tax claims are included on the SOFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Gifts in kind for use by the charity

These are included in the SOFA as Incoming resources when receivable and included within a restricted fund at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity.

Donated services

These are only included in Incoming resources where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the services or facilities received. During the period the charity was provided with the free use of office space, valued at £225 per month.

Volunteer help

The value of any volunteer help received is not included in the accounts.

Expenditure and liabilities

Generally, liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure.

Tangible assets

These are capitalised if they are capable of being used for more than one year. They are valued at cost or a reasonable estimate of their value on receipt. The charity does not have a policy of revaluation.

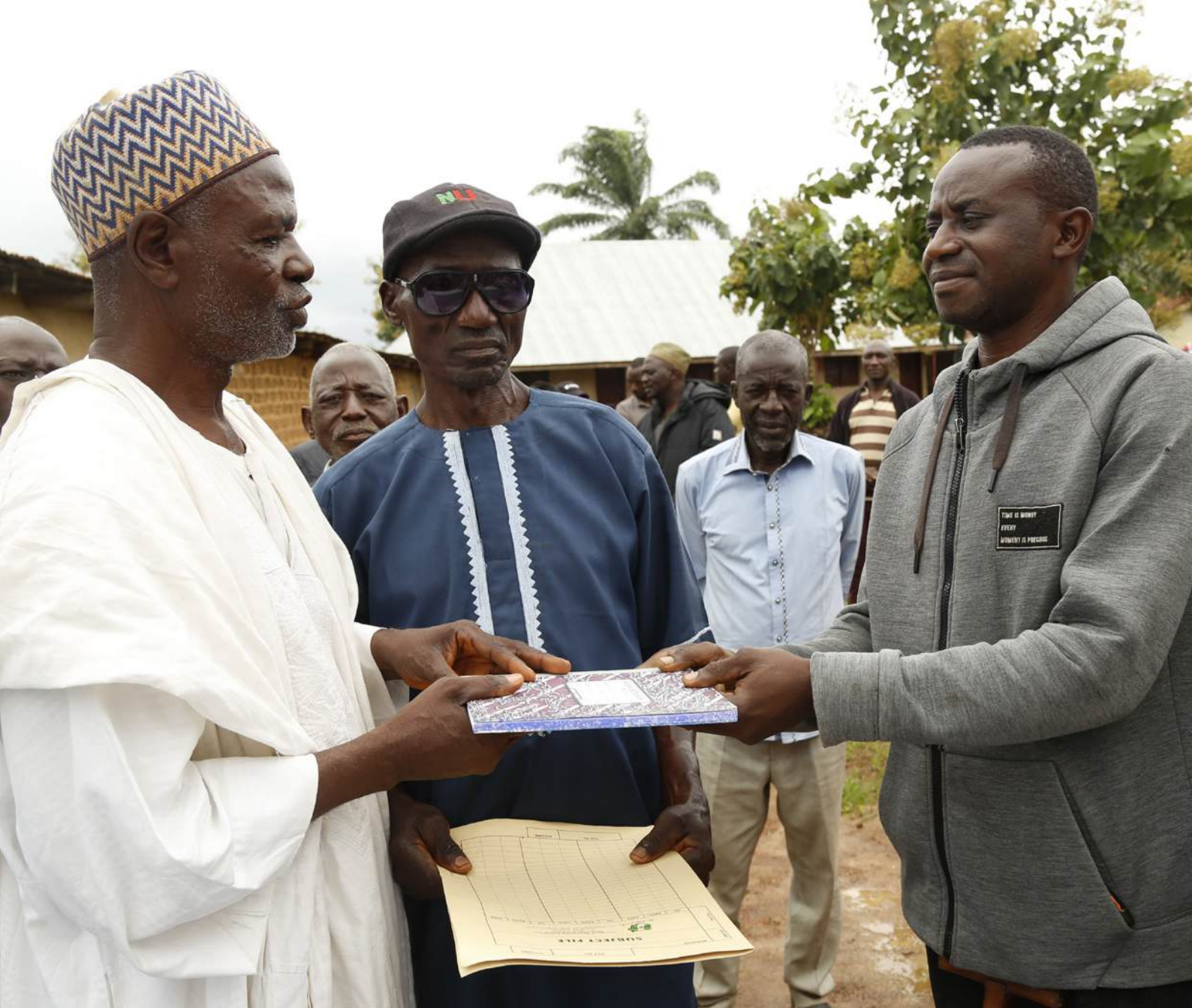
